Online Registration

 - » Personal Identification Number (PIN).
This is usually your birth date in MM/DD/YY format.
 - » Quarter you wish to register for from the drop-down menu.
5. Click **Enter Registration**.
6. Read the Welcome Page info and click **Continue**.

Using the Registration Screen to Add a Class

In an open box on the left-hand frame, enter the line number for each course you have selected. You may enter up to five classes at one time. Prerequisites must be added at the same time. After entering each number, click **Submit Add/Drop**.

To Add a Class with an Entry Code

- » You must first obtain the code from the instructor or department chair.
- » Enter the course line number and click **Submit Add/Drop**.
- » A message will display informing you that an entry code is required for the course you have selected. In the open box, enter the correct entry code. Click **Submit Entry Code**.

To Add a Variable Credit Course

To register for a variable-credit course, register first for that course before adding others, as the system will enroll you in the maximum number of credits available for the course. You may adjust the credits after you have registered for it.

- » Enter the course line number and click **Submit Add/Drop**.
- » Click **Change Credits**.
- » In the box displaying the current number of credits assigned to the course, enter the number of credits you need. Click **OK** to accept the change.

To Drop a Class


- » Enter the line number. Click **Submit Add/Drop**.
- » A message will display that you are about to drop a course. Click **OK** to confirm or **Cancel** to remain enrolled in the course.

To Complete Registration

- » Click **Finish**.

Waitlist

REMEMBER: When you are on a waitlist and an opening occurs, you will be automatically registered for the course. **Check the waitlist daily to avoid unwanted debt.** To check your position, see if you have been enrolled in a class from the waitlist, or if you have been removed from the waitlist go to www.skagit.edu and using the MySVC link, click on check your waitlist status.

All new and Non-Degree-Seeking students can register in-person at the Registration Office at any campus or center. The following students must register in-person or with advisor assistance:

 - » Students who require departmental or program advisor signatures on their registration form.
 - » Students registering on a space-available basis (including the Unemployed/Underemployed Tuition Waiver and Staff Waiver) must register in person on or after the first day of the quarter

* Fees:

General Fee—\$1 per credit up to a maximum of \$17 per quarter. In exchange for paying this fee, students receive ASSET and COMPASS testing as they enter the college, unlimited transcript requests prior to and after graduation, and graduation regalia and diplomas.

Student Technology Fee—\$5 per credit up to a maximum of \$40 per quarter. This is a student-controlled fee that pays for student-use technology such as computers and staffing for general computer labs, student e-mail, and other emerging technology enhancements.

ASSVC Self Assessed Building Fee—\$1.50 per credit up to a maximum of \$15 per quarter. Funds collected from this fee pay for student facilities at the college including the newly remodeled Campus Center building on the Mount Vernon Campus and improvements to student facilities on the Whidbey Island Campus and South Whidbey and San Juan centers.

Adult Basic Education & English as a Second Language Tuition Waiver

Students enrolling in Adult Basic Education or English as a Second Language classes are charged \$25.00 per person per quarter. An ABE/ESL tuition waiver may be granted—see Registration for eligibility.

Active Duty Military & Military Dependents

Same as resident fees.

Discharged Military Personnel & Dependents

Same as resident fees. (This waiver is good for 12 months after discharge.)



VETERAN'S WAIVER

A Veteran who was honorably discharged from the United States military/naval forces may be eligible for a 20% tuition waiver if the veteran meets all of the following requirements:

- Can qualify as a WA resident at the time of enrollment per RCW 28B.15.012.
- While serving as an active or reserve member in the U.S. military/naval forces or National Guard, the veteran served in a war or conflict fought on foreign soil, or in international waters, or in another location in support of U.S. military/naval forces that were on foreign soil or in international waters.
- Service is recorded on the veteran's DD-214 or other official military/naval document.

Unemployed or Under-Employed Residents

Unemployed or under-employed people may register for open classes on a space-available basis on or after the first day of the quarter without tuition charges. Fees attached to coursework will be charged accordingly. You are eligible if you:

- ▶ Have lived in Washington for at least 12 months.
- ▶ Are 21 years of age or more.
- ▶ Have not attended college in the past six months.
- ▶ Are not receiving or eligible for unemployment compensation.
- ▶ Have a combined monthly household income of below \$1,131 for a one-member family, \$1,431 for two, \$1,767 for three, \$2,085 for four, \$2,403 for five (call for amount for additional dependents).
- ▶ Have been or will be unemployed for six months prior to the start of the quarter.

Senior Citizen Audit

People 60 years of age or older, who have lived in Washington state for 12 months or longer, may enroll in a maximum of two classes for a \$5.00 tuition fee where there is space available on the first day of the class. Classes are subject to a \$5.00 per credit technology use fee and a \$1.50 student elective fee per credit. Self-supported classes or classes with special fees are not included in this category.

Add/Drop & Attendance Policies

Attendance

Students are expected to attend all classes in which they are registered, as evaluation of progress in any course is cumulative and based on class assignments, participation and examinations.

Course Drops

- ▶ **Up to the 3rd day of the quarter**, students may withdraw from a class via Web Registration or submit an Add/Drop form to the Registration Office.
- ▶ **Failure to attend** a class does not constitute a course drop. *Students who do not officially withdraw will be assessed full tuition fees, and refunds will not be made.* Requests for late drops will not be granted simply because the student was unaware of the policies, or failed to submit a drop form.
- ▶ **Courses dropped before the 10th instructional day** of the quarter will not be posted to the permanent student record.
- ▶ **Courses dropped after the 10th instructional day** through the end of the 6th week will be annotated "W" on the permanent student record.
- ▶ **Courses may not be dropped after the end of the 6th week** except through the hardship withdrawal process, and with instructor and advisor permission. The only exception to this is complete withdrawal from all courses of enrollment.

Course Adds

Until the 3rd day of the quarter, students may add courses via Web Registration or submit an Add/Drop form to the Registration Office according to space availability. After the third day, students must submit an Add/Drop form to the Registrar's Office.

After the 3rd day of the quarter, course adds will be made only with the instructor's signature, and in consideration of the wait list, if any. A course Add/Drop form must be submitted to the Registrar's Office.

2008-2009 State Support of Higher Education Students

RCW 28B.76.300 directs colleges to provide "state support" information to students. This requirement became effective fall quarter 1997, and must be provided to students quarterly. 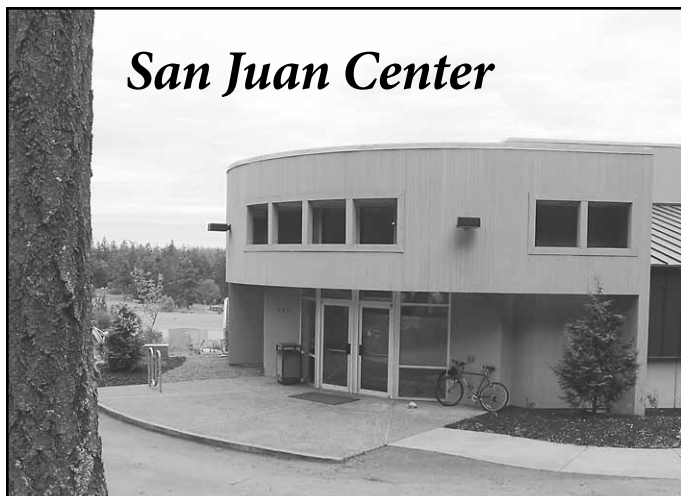

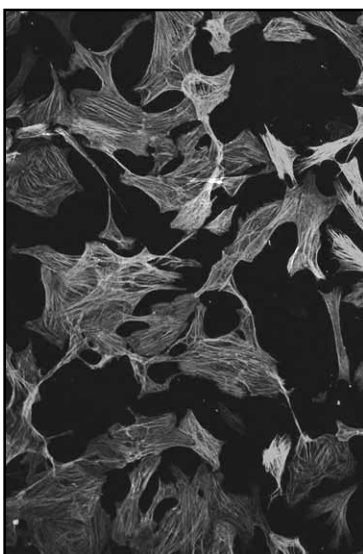

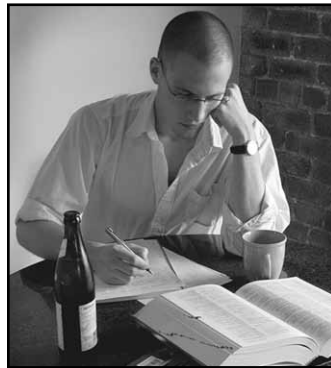

MATHEMATICS

ASET/COMPASS placement test required. MATH classes are offered in a LAB setting with a combination of self-directed problems sets and mini-lectures mixed with at-home assignments and in-class examinations. Additional support is available through My Math Lab and SVC computer lab.

eLearning at SVC

SVC offers students a variety of eLearning resources on campus and off. Here are some of ways education can come 2U:

Online Courses: Coursework is done completely online. Students can access materials anywhere they can access the internet. Instructors are available by phone and e-mail to assist students. Online courses are a great option for students to take courses without having to come to campus. The courses follow the same schedule as campus classes, and study times are flexible around personal schedules.
