## Online Registration

  - » Student Identification Number (SID).
  - » Personal Identification Number (PIN).  
This is usually your birth date in MM/DD/YY format.
  - » Quarter you wish to register for from the drop-down menu.
5. Click **Enter Registration**.
6. Read the Welcome Page info and click **Continue**.

### Using the Registration Screen to Add a Class

In an open box on the left-hand frame, enter the line number for each course you have selected. You may enter up to five classes at one time. Prerequisites must be added at the same time. After entering each number, click **Submit Add/Drop**.

### To Add a Class with an Entry Code

- » You must first obtain the code from the instructor or department chair.
- » Enter the course line number and click **Submit Add/Drop**.
- » A message will display informing you that an entry code is required for the course you have selected. In the open box, enter the correct entry code. Click **Submit Entry Code**.

### To Add a Variable Credit Course

To register for a variable-credit course, register first for that course before adding others, as the system will enroll you in the maximum number of credits available for the course. You may adjust the credits after you have registered for it.

- » Enter the course line number and click **Submit Add/Drop**.
- » Click **Change Credits**.
- » In the box displaying the current number of credits assigned to the course, enter the number of credits you need. Click **OK** to accept the change.

### To Drop a Class

- » Enter the line number. Click **Submit Add/Drop**.
- » A message will display that you are about to drop a course. Click **OK** to confirm or **Cancel** to remain enrolled in the course.

### To Complete Registration

- » Click **Finish**.

## Waitlist

**REMEMBER:** When you are on a waitlist and an opening occurs, you will be automatically registered for the course. **Check the waitlist daily to avoid unwanted debt.** To check your position, see if you have been enrolled in a class from the waitlist, or if you have been removed from the waitlist go to [www.skagit.edu](http://www.skagit.edu), click the *MySVC* link, then under **Student Toolbox** (left column), click **Registration Tools**, then **Check/Drop Waitlists**.

- **NOTE:** It is your responsibility to monitor your movement on the waitlist. You will be charged for all classes in which you are enrolled from the electronic waitlist.

## In-Person Registration

All new and Non-Degree-Seeking students can register in-person at the Registration Office at any campus or center. The following students must register in-person or with advisor assistance:

  - » Under 18 years of age
  - » Students who require departmental or program advisor signatures on their registration form.
  - » Students registering on a space-available basis (including the Unemployed/Underemployed Tuition Waiver and Staff Waiver) must register in person on or after the first day of the quarter

## Helpful Hints with Online Registration

Your **SID** number is a 9-digit system-assigned number. Your **PIN** is your birth date as a 6-digit number until you change it.

### Adult Basic Education/ESL

\$25.00 per person per quarter. An ABE/ESL tuition waiver may be granted—see Registration for eligibility.

#### \* Fees:

**General Fee**—\$2 per credit up to a maximum of \$34.00 per quarter. In exchange for paying this fee students receive placement testing as they enter the college, unlimited transcript requests prior to and after graduation, graduation regalia and diplomas, a yearly parking permit decal (MV campus) and parking maintenance of the district's owned parking lots at Mount Vernon, Whidbey Island and San Juan Island.

**Student Technology Fee**—\$5 per credit up to a maximum of \$40 per quarter. This is a student-controlled fee that pays for student-use technology such as computers and staffing for general computer labs, student e-mail, and other emerging technology enhancements.

**ASSVC Self Assessed Building Fee**—\$1.50 per credit up to a maximum of \$15 per quarter. Funds collected from this fee pay for student facilities at the college including the newly remodeled Campus Center building on the Mount Vernon Campus and improvements to student facilities on the Whidbey Island Campus and South Whidbey and San Juan centers.

**eLEARNING Fee**—\$22.00 per eLearning and/or hybrid course up to a maximum of \$44 per quarter. This fee subsidizes the cost of the software licenses necessary to offer courses in online formats. It also pays for the cost of on-ground, online, and telephone support for eLearning students.

## Active Duty Military & Military Dependents

## Discharged Military Personnel & Dependents

Same as resident fees. (This waiver is good for 12 months after discharge.)

### VETERAN'S WAIVER

A Veteran who was honorably discharged from the United States military/naval forces may be eligible for a 20% tuition waiver if the veteran meets all of the following requirements:

1. Can qualify as a WA resident at the time of enrollment per RCW 28B.15.012.
2. While serving as an active or reserve member in the U.S. military/naval forces or National Guard, the veteran served in a war or conflict fought on foreign soil, or in international waters, or in another location in support of U.S. military/naval forces that were on foreign soil or in international waters.
3. Service is recorded on the veteran's DD-214 or other official military/naval document.

### Unemployed or Under-Employed Residents

Unemployed or under-employed people may register for open classes on a space-available basis on or after the first day of the quarter without tuition charges. Fees attached to coursework will be charged accordingly. You are eligible if you:

- ▶ Have lived in Washington for at least 12 months.
- ▶ Are 21 years of age or more.
- ▶ Have not attended college in the past six months.
- ▶ Are not receiving or eligible for unemployment compensation.
- ▶ Have a combined monthly household income of below \$1,128 for a one-member family, \$1,428 for two, \$1,763 for three, \$2,080 for four, \$2,397 for five (call for amount for additional dependents).
- ▶ Have been or will be unemployed for six months prior to the start of the quarter.

## Add/Drop & Attendance Policies

### Attendance

Students are expected to attend all classes in which they are registered, as evaluation of progress in any course is cumulative and based on class assignments, participation and examinations.

### Course Drops

- ▶ **Up to the 3rd day of the quarter**, students may withdraw from a class via Web Registration or submit an Add/Drop form to the Registration Office.
- ▶ **Failure to attend** a class does not constitute a course drop. *Students who do not officially withdraw will be assessed full tuition fees, and refunds will not be made.* Requests for late drops will not be granted simply because the student was unaware of the policies, or failed to submit a drop form.
- ▶ **Courses dropped before the 10th instructional day** of the quarter will not be posted to the permanent student record.
- ▶ **Courses dropped after the 10th instructional day** will be annotated "W" on the permanent student record.
- ▶ **Courses may be dropped any time before close of business** on Friday, Dec. 2. The only exception is that all courses of enrollment may be dropped by the last day of the quarter, Friday, Dec. 9.

### Course Adds

**Until the 3rd day of the quarter**, students may add courses via Web Registration or submit an Add/Drop form to the Registration Office according to space availability. After the third day, students must submit an Add/Drop form to the Registrar's Office.

**After the 3rd day of the quarter**, course adds will be made only with the instructor's signature, and in consideration of the wait list, if any. A course Add/Drop form must be submitted to the Registrar's Office.

## Complaint Process

## ENGLISH

ENGL 97, 99 and 101 are offered concurrently in a LAB setting. The LAB consists of a combination of assigned individual work, mini-lectures, in class presentation, and small group work. It is expected that students will be in attendance for the scheduled class period with both in and out of class writing assignments. COMPASS test required.

### **ENGL 097 Improving Grammar I**

Designed to teach students to write, analyze, and revise their own sentences and to begin to develop coherent paragraphs. Prerequisite: Appropriate test score.

### **ENGL& 101 English Composition I**

The study of fundamental writing skills and varied writing strategies leading to the planning, organizing, writing, and revising of academic essays. Prerequisite: Appropriate COMPASS score or grade of 2.0 or higher in ENGL 99.

## MATHEMATICS

ASSET/COMPASS placement test required. MATH classes are offered in a LAB setting with a combination of self-directed problem sets and mini-lectures mixed with at-home assignments and in-class examinations. Additional support is available through My Math Lab and SVC computer lab.

### **MATH 095 Basic Mathematics**

A beginning mathematics course designed to establish a solid mathematical foundation. Topics include: operations using whole numbers, decimals, fractions, and integers; determining

place-value and order of operations; calculations using ratios and proportions, percents, simple and compound interest, relevant applications.

**MATH 096 Pre-Algebra**

A course designed to review arithmetic concepts and introduce algebra. Topics include: fractions, ratio and proportion, percent, basic geometry, U.S. and metric systems of measurement, and an introduction to algebra. Prerequisite: Math 095 with a grade of C or higher, or equivalent math placement score.

**MATH 097 Beginning Algebra I**

A beginning course in algebra. Topics include: algebraic expressions, solving linear equations and inequalities, ratios and proportions, graphing and determining linear equations, systems of linear equations. A graphing calculator may be required. Prerequisite: Math 096 with a grade of C or higher, or equivalent math placement score.

**MATH 098 Beginning Algebra II**

A second course in beginning algebra building on topics from math 097. Topics include: exponents, operations with polynomials, factoring, solving quadratic equations by factoring, rational expressions and equations, functions. A graphing calculator may be required. Prerequisite: Math 097 with a grade of C or higher, or equivalent math placement score.

5464 MATH 098 AP (5) 01:45PM-04:15PM TTh RM C BALISE

**MATH 099 Intermediate Algebra**

A course designed to prepare students for entry into college-level mathematics courses. Topics include: systems of equations, linear and absolute value inequalities, rational exponents and radicals, complex numbers, solving and graphing quadratic equations, composite and inverse functions, logarithmic and exponential functions. A graphing calculator may be required. Prerequisite: Math 098 with a grade of C or higher, or appropriate math placement score.

**MATH& 107 Math in Society**

A terminal course in mathematics for non-math or non-science majors. The course fulfills the quantitative reasoning requirement for the AAUCT degree and for transfer. Topics may include logic, probability, statistics, geometry, modeling, linear algebra, finance, trigonometry, problem solving, and the history of mathematics. A graphing calculator may be required. Prerequisite: MATH 099 with a grade of C or higher, or equivalent math placement score.

5475 MATH& 107 AP (5) 01:45PM-04:15PM TTh RM C BALISE

**MATH& 141 Precalculus I**

This course covers fundamental topics of algebra, including: polynomials, exponential and logarithmic functions, and their graphs; system of equations; inequalities; and curve sketching. A graphing calculator may be required. Prerequisite: MATH 099 with a grade of C or higher, or equivalent math placement score.

**DAY**

5480 MATH& 141 AP (5) 01:45PM-04:15PM TTh RM C BALISE

**MATH& 142 Precalculus II**

This course covers trigonometric functions, complex numbers, the solution of triangles, and conic sections. A graphing calculator may be required. Prerequisite: MATH& 141 with a grade of C or higher, or equivalent math placement score.

**MATH& 146 Introduction to Stats**

This course presents a connected introduction to probability and statistics using statistical inference as its theme. The course covers descriptive statistics, probability distributions including the binomial and normal distributions, confidence intervals and hypothesis tests, and linear regression and correlation with an emphasis on statistical inference. A graphing calculator may be required. Prerequisite: MATH 099 with a grade of C or higher or equivalent math placement score.

**MATH& 151 Calculus I**

Limits and continuity, differentiation and applications, Mean value theorem, applications of differentiation, related rates, curve sketching, min-max problems, concavity, and anti-derivatives. A graphing calculator is required. Prerequisite: MATH& 142 with a grade of C or higher or equivalent math placement score.

**MATH& 152 Calculus II**

This course covers the study of indefinite integrals, applications of integration, techniques of integration, and an introduction to differential equations. A graphing calculator is required. Prerequisite: MATH& 151 with a grade of C or higher.

## E-Learning at SVC

SVC offers students a variety of E-Learning resources on campus and off. Here are some ways education can come to you:

- **Online Courses:** Coursework is done completely online. Students can access materials anywhere they can access the internet. Instructors are available by phone and e-mail to assist students. Online courses are a great option for students to take courses without having to come to campus. The courses follow the same schedule as campus classes and study times are flexible around personal schedules.
- **Hybrid Courses:** Coursework is done partially online and partially at an SVC campus and the online portion is required.
- **Web-enhanced Courses:** Coursework is done at an SVC Campus, but the instructor will have extra resources available online. The online portion will not be required.

### What support is available for E-Learning?


SVC students are able to obtain a university transfer degree as well as several certificates online. Services include virtual library resources; financial aid; online advising and registration; and an online bookstore. Lots of personal tools are available as well as free email, schedule, transcript, and quarterly grade access.

**What skills and equipment do I need to succeed?** You don't have to be a computer wizard to have the technical skills necessary to be a successful online learner, but you do need:

- To be able to navigate the Internet, using a browser.
- Basic computer skills, including: typing, using a mouse, saving, editing and opening a document, and ability to cut/paste and copy text.
- To use email and attach a file to your email message.
- A computer with internet access and a reliable internet service provider.

\*SVC provides every student with an email account. This account is the primary tool for official college communications.

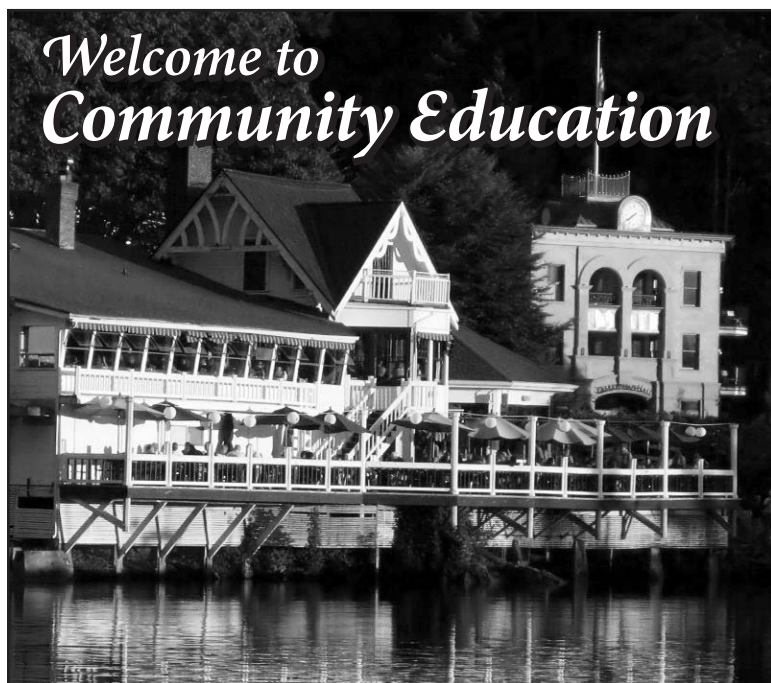
