Achievement: Drive To Succeed


SVC graduate and mechanical engineer Miguel Strouse lands his dream job at TESLA.

iguel was raised in an unstable and financially precarious family setting. Working small jobs to help support the family from age 11, he was brought to the US as a child. When his mother's employment fell through and she returned to Mexico, Miguel was left in Sedro-Woolley. He was 16, didn't speak English, and had no family support.

"Those were lonely times," he recalls. But soon, he established goals and set about working toward reaching them. His first goals were to learn English and graduate from Sedro-Woolley High School. He immediately began to make an impression, and teachers nominated him for the

Champions of Diversity scholarship at Skagit Valley College. After graduating in 2008, he entered SVC, where he received guidance and support from college staff and instructors.

He first joined the Automotive Technology program, but soon realized his real interest was in the engineering of the engines. Gaining confidence, he set his sights on earning a transfer degree. He graduated from SVC in 2014 with an Associate's Degree in Engineering/Physics and was admitted to Washington State University.



During three years at WSU, he focused on science and math. He served as vice-president of the Society of Latino Engineers and Scientists, an organization dedicated to industry and faculty networking, and mentoring support for incoming students.

In 2017, he earned a
Bachelor's in Mechanical
Engineering and began
a quest to join a premier
firm in engineering
and technology. After
submitting many
job applications and
undergoing several
interviews, he landed his
dream job. Today, he is
employed at Tesla, where
he is leading small groups
of engineers in quality
analysis.

Miguel's journey is the story of remarkable personal drive and achievement. It is also a story of a community supporting the success of young people. Patient tutors, inspiring instructors and anonymous scholarship donors have all played a role in Miguel's amazing progress.

"I feel very grateful for all the support I received and I intend to pay it forward to others," Miguel says.



Skagit Valley College was pleased to nominate Valerie McCormack for the Washington State Association of College Trustees (ACT) 2018 Transforming Lives Award. This award recognizes current or former students whose lives have been transformed by pursuing higher education at a community or technical college.

s a single mother and an older student returning to college, Valerie McCormack is highly motivated to pursue her educational goals and transform her life, despite many personal challenges and tragedies.

"Thanks in part to scholarships from the college, I can get an education. I know this is my second chance in life and I'm willing to do what it takes."

From an early age, she suffered abuse and neglect from an alcoholic mother and a father who was in and out of prison. The final betrayal came when Valerie was 13: "My mother's boyfriend was sexually assaulting me and when I told her, she chose him over me and kicked me out. I joined a gang and dropped out of school in the 8th grade. At 14, I became a teenage mom and was in an abusive relationship. At the time, I thought there was something wrong with me and this was how I was meant to be treated."

Later, Valerie suffered heart-breaking tragedies, losing two of her four children—an eight-year-old daughter to cancer and a five-month-old son to SIDS. Devastated, she turned to drugs and alcohol and, at her lowest ebb, attempted suicide. "At a turning point, I was invited to church where I met my angels who helped me have hope, and I put myself into treatment. I am happy to say I now have many years of living clean and sober."

In sharing her courageous story, Valerie offers a message of hope and perseverance: "When I think about my life, I realize that I have overcome many challenging obstacles. My advice is: Don't let what others say affect your decision about your educational dreams and goals. Education is the pathway to success. It's never too late to go back to college."


The future is a bright one for Valerie McCormack. She earned a high school diploma through SVC's High School 21+ program and is enrolled in the Human Services program.

ongratulations to two exceptional SVC students, Jordan Shelley and Alexander Hood, who both received the Sydney S. McIntyre, Jr. Memorial Scholarship. This coveted scholarship provides full tuition, books, room, and board for two years at any Washington state public college or university for students pursuing a bachelor's degree in math, science, or engineering.

For Jordan Shelley, life is a blend of global experiences and unwavering optimism. Born in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia in a poverty-stricken family, Jordan was six when his father died and he and his siblings were taken to an orphanage. After six months, they were adopted by a family from Greenbank, Washington. Jordan says, "I've been blessed, unlike many, with a great opportunity and for the sake of myself and those who have sacrificed to get me where I am, I strive to reach my highest potential." This fall, he will attend the University of Washington and is motivated to become a doctor. "I desire to receive a college degree that will allow me to get a career that will provide financial stability and medical knowledge. With both in hand, I'll have the power to give back to my present community, as well as one day have the ability to travel back to Ethiopia to aid my people."



With the natural beauty of Anacortes all around him, Alexander Hood learned to appreciate the environment. Although neither of his parents went to college, they encouraged him to do so. After graduation from high school, he delayed college plans and spent time operating his own handy-man business. Realizing a better future was out there, he enrolled at SVC with the goal of becoming an engineer and excelled academically and found his niche in life. This fall, he will attend Western Washington University to pursue a degree in electrical engineering with a special emphasis on renewable energy. The future is a bright one for Alexander: "As a solar engineer, I will utilize my skills to develop new solutions for alternative energy to help curb the threat of climate change."


