Dream Big! The Sky's the Limit!

As a successful physician in Arkansas and CEO of the Arkansas Foundation for Medical Care, an early morning meeting isn't unusual for Dr. Nick Paslidis, but this one was different — very different. When President Barack Obama was introduced, hearts began to flutter just a bit. Dr. Paslidis had been invited as Arkansas Governor Mike Beebe's guest to represent him and Arkansas at a meeting about health care at the White House in October 2009.

"The Governors' meeting was quite an honor," said Dr. Paslidis. "Governor Beebe invited me and I was the only individual there on behalf of his presence."

As an internal medicine physician with numerous high-level appointments

and honors, Dr. Paslidis inspires others naturally. His approach is simple. "Think big! The sky's the limit, as long there is commitment, opportunity...and faith."

These life threads were important in Nick's boyhood home in Greece too. With an opportunity to study abroad through the education program, Youth For Understanding — and with his family's encouragement — Nick came to Mount Vernon High School for his senior year. After graduation, he returned to Greece that summer to make college plans.

In 1976, Nick Paslidis decided to return to Mount Vernon, the town he considered his second home, and began his journey to medicine at Skagit Valley College. While earning his transfer degree, he excelled in math and science, taking many courses in the original Angst Hall. He often enrolled in over 30 credits per quarter and earned straight As.

For Nick, it was a perfect fit. "I started in a small community college and appreciate what Skagit offered me. I needed that environment and support, versus a big university where you sometimes lose that support mechanism. I loved the environment!"

In recognition of his academic excellence, Nick earned SVC's prestigious Charles Lewis Award in 1978, along with a fellow student. He was the first international student to receive the award and it was the first time that two students earned it the same year.

In thinking about the future, Dr. Nick Paslidis added: "I always thought, what a great opportunity to come back...if there was an alumni event and say, 'I appreciate what Skagit Valley College gave me. The opportunity to be the link to get to the next level.' I'd love to have the opportunity to say, *Dream big! The sky's the limit!*"



Laura Angst Hall

Under a canopy of wispy white clouds on September 15, 2009, the Skagit Valley College Board of Trustees, faculty, staff, and students welcomed community members to the Dedication Ceremony of Laura Angst Hall, the college's new sciences and health occupations building. Also joining the celebration were special guests Arthur and James Angst, both great nephews of Dr. Laura Angst.

The official program began at 11:00 a.m. at the steps of the building's east entrance with a welcome from SVC President Dr. Gary Tollefson. At that moment, Skagit Valley College entered a new era of providing students and the community with access to outstanding sciences and healthcare training facilities. The day included building tours, department demonstrations, and opportunities to meet the faculty.

Named for SVC's pioneer biology professor, Laura Angst Hall replaced the aging one-story Angst Hall, which opened in 1958 and was one the seven original buildings constructed on the Mount Vernon Campus. Dr. Laura Angst joined the SVC faculty for the 1927-28 academic year and led the Biological Science department until her retirement in 1950. While the original building served the college well for five decades, it no longer provided adequate space for fast-growing science and health care programs.



At 65,232 square feet, Laura Angst Hall is a cornerstone on the Mount Vernon Campus, providing exceptional learning environments for fast-growing healthcare occupations and the sciences. By working closely with regional healthcare providers, community partners, economic leaders, and other colleges and universities, SVC continues to address the demand for highly skilled healthcare professionals as well as science scholars and researchers in our region. With state-of-the-art simulation labs, the Nursing and Allied Health departments have increased capacity to serve students. Currently, approximately 280 students are enrolled in Registered and Practical Nursing, Medical Assistant, Pharmacy Technician, Medical Billing and Coding, Phlebotomy, Patient Registration, and Medical Front Office. In addition, the building features classroom and lab learning environments for the sciences including Astronomy, Biological Science, Chemistry, Environmental Conservation, Geology, and Physics.

Students who enter Laura Angst Hall are immersed in an environment where the latest technology and eLearning advances are integrated into their everyday studies. Wi-Fi networks and smart classrooms allow SVC to offer more eLearning options in partnership with other community colleges and four-year universities across Washington. Comfortable

study areas with views of Mount Baker to the north, Little Mountain to the south, Mount Erie to the west, and Cultus Mountatin to the east provide that added bit of inspiration.

SVC's ongoing commitment to sustainability is celebrated in Laura Angst Hall as a "green" building with multiple environmentally friendly features. As a result, the building has met the U.S. Green Building Council's Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Silver rating and we anticipate at least a Gold rating. Design and construction targets the highest standards in energy conservation including lighting that self-adjusts to incoming natural light, a rain garden and select plantings to collect excess rainfall, and photovoltaic panels that supply approximately 8.5% of the building's non-lab energy use and up to 4% of the building's energy use.







Like Mother, Like Daughter: Two Share Skagit Valley College Foundation Scholarship

While it's not unusual for two people to share the same foundation scholarship at Skagit Valley College, it's unlikely that the pair would be mother and daughter.

"They told us that had never happened before," Crystal Nelson said.

College staff have predicted a bluechip future for Oak Harbor residents Andrea Nelson and daughter Crystal, who each received a \$1,000 scholarship from the Skagit Valley College Foundation last May. College spokesperson Arden Ainley said the Nelsons' story is particularly inspiring.

Andrea is originally from Taiwan and said that only two generations ago, her grandmother didn't have access to an education.

"I feel like I'm doing this for my grandmother. She's kind of in me," Andrea said.

Born of Chinese descent, her grandmother was adopted into a Taiwanese family to become the son's future wife. While the son attended school, she was encouraged to tend to the cattle. Although schooling was required in Taiwan, her adopted parents hid her from authorities, Andrea said.

As she was growing up, Andrea's grandmother always stressed the importance of education. Today, Andrea is a single mom who works at night and attends classes in the daytime while maintaining a 4.0 grade point average.

She began courses at Skagit Valley College 10 years ago, starting with improving her English skills. In June she will earn her Licensed Practical Nursing degree. She wants to become a nurse at Careage of Whidbey, where she currently works.

Andrea is proud to show her own daughters what an education can do.


"I used to have low self-esteem having English as a second language," she said. "But I have a passion inside me that's been burning all these years. People say that they can tell I enjoy my job. They say, 'You're always smiling."

Crystal is studying to become a linguist and speaks Japanese, Chinese and Russian. She hopes to become a novelist one day and translate her own books.

SVC Foundation Endowments Weather Economic Storm Better than Other Colleges

Good News! College endowments seem to be on the rebound according to early national indicators from a National Association of College and University Business Officers (NACUBO) and Commonfund (largest U.S. nonprofit investment manager serving over 70 percent of the nation's top 100 educational endowments) joint national survey. This preliminary survey showed that most college funds across the country lost approximately 19 percent of their value in the 2008-2009 fiscal year. Skagit Valley College Foundation weathered this economic storm with a slightly lower loss of 16 percent in 2008-2009.

"The fact that the overall average for the 500-plus colleges in the NACUBO-Commonfund early peek is significantly lower than those high-profile universities suggests that the investments of smaller institutions—which typically invest more cautiously—fared better in the downturn than did the behemoths [i.e. Harvard, Princeton, Stanford]. Still, negative returns even in the teens are much bigger than many colleges are used to, and the 19 percent decline would represent the biggest drop for college investments since the 1970s," reports Inside Higher Education Editor Doug Lederman.

Skagit Valley College Foundation's total endowment portfolio as of December 2009 totaled \$6,166,516, compared to December 2008 at \$4,945,690--a positive increase that reflects improved market conditions. SVC Foundation investments in the Commonfund consist of bond, equity, REIT and international equity funds. These funds had a total performance increase of 29 percent in 2009.

"Improving markets will definitely help our foundation increase student scholarship support for Fall 2010," Carl Young, SVC Foundation Interim Director, stated. "Our prudent investment policy has served us well during these tough economic times."
